Their ministries challenged us to look at our conveniences, the safety we live with and the support many of us have been given.

#### Celebrating Lives By Sister Ana Cloughly, OSB

Death like birth, is the one experience we all share. During the time of the COVID-19 pandemic three of our sisters died. Thankfully, none died as a result of the pandemic. However, celebrating their lives with their family community and friends has been postponed. Their cremains were placed in our small chapel until we were able to celebrate their lives.

How we celebrate a sister's life depends on the sister. Some, like <u>Sister Charlotte</u> wanted a private service with the community. <u>Sister Josie</u> wanted her family to celebrate with us. And <u>Sister Diane</u> wanted her family to really celebrate with musically gifted family members, especially her brother to join in by playing the piano in the celebration after Mass.

Although we are deeply saddened when our beloved sisters die, we also have the knowledge that life is not ended, only changed.



These have also been years of loss. Over my ten years as prioress, we have had to bury twelve of our dear sisters. It is just unimaginable. These were women who have given 50, 60 or 70 years of loving service. They are dearly missed and our hearts break with each loss.

The years have gone by quickly and I want to thank all of you who have made it such a profound experience.

And now I want to introduce you to our new Prioress, <u>Sister</u> <u>Marie Therese (MT) Summers</u>. Sister MT is a very gifted woman. These past years she has served as Treasurer for the community. She has a keen mind and a generous heart. Her energy comes from a longing and a vision of being a servant leader. She desires to lead with compassion, gentleness and wisdom. She is to *"Hold the place of Christ." (RB 2:3)* She is so grateful for her Benedictine heritage.

One awareness that Sister MT speaks of *"The laborers are few and the harvest is great."* She is attuned to the broader needs of the sisters and the world; she prays for more <u>oblates</u> and <u>volunteers</u> to join us here at the monastery. Daily she hangs the Earth Flag on our property reminding her that we are to be inclusive of all those who share this world of ours. There is such a need for hope, healing and reconciliation. She asks for your support and your prayers.

Finally, we continue to trust in the *"slow work of God"* as we discern the monastery's future. I invite you to carefully read pages 6-7 and pray for us. May Christ find home here and in the hearts of all who come here.

### We Remember...Sister Charlotte Redpath, OSB

Sister Charlotte (Dominic) Redpath, OSB died peacefully April 20, 2021. Her parents, Percy A. Redpath and Lena Horney had nine children-Charlotte was the youngest, born on January 14, 1934 in Minneapolis, MN. She was baptized Charlotte Marlene. Her family was very loving and close. Her father died when she was only three years old and she recalled her mother being a strong woman. Her mother's strength cultivated Charlotte's own strong and adventurous spirit.

Upon graduating from high school, Charlotte made a bike trip across Europe taking photos as she went. This experience helped develop her artistic gifts. After returning home, she entered St. Paul Monastery in St. Paul, MN in 1958 and made her first monastic profession in 1960. In 1967, Charlotte earned a BA in Art from College of St. Catherine St. Paul, MN. She taught art in high schools and colleges in Minnesota.

The 1960s and 70s saw many changes in the lives of religious women. Sister Charlotte took the unique role as the Director of Fine Art Education in Phoenix, AZ for the U.S. Department of the Interior from 1969-1970. By 1981, Sister Charlotte's adventurous heart joined with Sister Katherine Wawersich and three other Benedictine sisters to found The Spirit of Life Monastery in Lakewood, Colorado. They also created The Spirit of Life Center to provide for the spiritual needs of adults. From 1987 to 1999, she served as their community's prioress. Charlotte earned an MA in Counseling and Psychology from the Arizona State University Tempe, AZ in 1984. She realized that combining art into her practice as a counselor and as a spiritual director opened new paths to psychological and spiritual well-being to those she served.

Over the next two decades, Charlotte shared her paintings, weavings and photographs in art shows around the country. She combined many of her exhibition trips with camping and hiking excursions into remote places in the United States and Canada. Charlotte loved being in nature discovering opportunities to take unique photos. She saw the beauty of God in everything.

In 2003, Sister Charlotte, along with <u>Sister Katherine Wawersich</u>, transferred her vow of stability to Benet Hill Monastery. Charlotte continued her ministry of counseling, spiritual direction and creating beautiful cards from her many photographs. She taught



art classes to the women in formation and she would say, "Whenever you are outside, take the time to look up at the sky. It will enliven your creativity."

Sister Charlotte's later years gave her time for her other great love, reading. Her tastes were expansive and she took great pleasure in having her intellect and imagination ignited by a good book and she generously shared her reading list with sisters, oblates and friends.

Sister Charlotte loved her family and community. Her profound appreciation for beauty in all its forms flowed from her deep love for the God of all creation.

A private service (per her request) was held on May 22, 2021 for Sister Charlotte Redpath with her sisters and the <u>oblates</u> of Benet Hill Monastery.

# My Experience as a Newly Professed Oblate



As I write this, I have been a professed <u>oblate</u> for less than twenty-four hours. And yet, I have been journeying toward my oblation for a very long time. In yesterday's oblation ceremony, Sister Clare asked whether each of us would dedicate ourselves to the service of God according to the Rule of Benedict followed by this pivotal declaration: *"Since God has given you this grace and you trust in God's help..."*. There it is!

God's grace will suffice and we must seek God in total trust. This is the shift I have felt during my time of study and preparation. In signing my Profession of Oblation on Holy Scripture, I felt both the import of the moment and a great freedom to move ahead in my walk with Christ.

Everything is the same and nothing is the same. My life has taken on added meaning. Echoing both the newly Professed and the Re-commitment of the professed oblates, "...in so far as my state in life permits" "...Through my daily prayer and work may I be inspired to live in Christ and to bring [God's] love to the world and [God's] peace to all hearts...". #### Community Retreat: To Live in God's Glory By

The sisters and some oblates attended our annual retreat June 20-25. Fr. Xavier Nacke, OSB from Conception Abbey was our delightful director. Fr. Xavier was so enthusiastic and animated that he held our attention during each of the conferences. His sense of humor and humility added to the richness of these days.

The challenge issued to all of us was *"to let God love me."* God's glory is the gift of grace which we can receive or not. If we receive it, we can live in the presence of God. We live in awe of God that we may be given the Spirit of wisdom and evolving knowledge of God in our daily lives. This glory is poured out to purify, transform and vivify.

During our time together, Fr. Nacke introduced us to some previously unknown mystics and authors, including St. Elizabeth of the Trinity and St. Symeon, the New Theologian. We studied scripture passages from the book of Judith, Paul's letters to the Corinthians and the Psalms. Each of these reflected a deep reverence and personal relation with God. Our soul's destiny is to live in the presence of God and *"to let God love me."*

#### Federation of St. Scholastica Pre-Chapter: June 16 – 18, 2021

The Federation of St. Scholastica President, Sister Lynn McKenzie, OSB welcomed the prioresses and delegates of the member monasteries. Sister Lynn's address challenged us to be creative in ways to increase diversity, advocacy, and radical hospitality.

Addie Walker spoke on "Confronting Racism in Community" with poignant personal experiences, stories, and humor. Her two-hour presentation with slides and commentary was informative and increased awareness of the systemic ways racism is perpetuated in our education, housing, healthcare, economic, and political systems.

The history of our Federation was told by four past presidents covering the years from 1971-2021. The women witnessed to their deep love of Benedictinism and the importance of being authentic women of faith. The years between 1998 – 2010 were especially fraught with challenges by the Apostolic Visitation and graced with support and stronger bonds between monasteries and those the sisters serve.

The second panel was composed of newer monastics from different monasteries offering their love of Benedictinism, respect of the wise elders, and their hopes and enthusiasm for the future of monastic life. The positive energy and optimism were refreshing and reassuring. Our future is in good hands.

The breakout groups provided excellent discussions allowing themes and priorities to surface. These were synthesized and reported. During this year, various working committees will create the agenda for the Federation Chapter in June 2022.

## Sanctuary of Peace Groundbreaking

On Saturday June 19, 2021, we officially broke ground on the <u>Sanctuary of Peace Residential Community</u> at Benet Hill. The sisters hosted a beautiful prayer and blessing on the site followed by lunch for all their guests in the dining room.

Guests included Bishop Emeritus Most Reverend Richard Hanifen who offered a brief prayer and a few words of blessings on the new community. David Gorman, a principal of the Civil Engineering firm MVE Engineers, Inc. who has shepherded us through the four-year construction approval process with the county and the state also attended. Tom Kahn, the founder and CEO of Kahn Construction in Centennial, Colorado along with Kevin Kahn, the COO supplied the golden shovels and the hard hats to make the groundbreaking go smoothly.

Each of the former living prioresses of the monastery joined the current Prioress, Sister Clare Carr, the Prioress Elect, Sister MT Summers and myself for turning over the first few spades of soil on the site that will one day be the common house for the new community. Also present were a number of <u>oblates</u>, family and friends of the monastery, and several excited future residents who have already committed to making the Sanctuary of Peace Residential Community their new home as soon as it is ready for occupancy.

Construction of the infrastructure of the project should take between four to six months. If all goes as planned, we hope to get the first few foundations for homes in place before the snow flies so that we can continue construction through the winter months. We presently anticipate completion and full occupancy of the entire community in about the next two years.

#### Lilly Family School of Philanthropy



Grant Award / Benet Hill awarded a grant for "Advancing Mission 2.0: Women Religious in the 21st Century," a program of Indiana University's Lilly Family School of Philanthropy and the Lake Institute for Faith and Giving. The 3-year program is intended to help the monastery build its capacity to attract, steward, and grow resources for ministry.

Sisters Cast a Vision / Sisters meet with oblates present for first time as observers. Sisters conclude that their legacy will be to imbue future generations with Benedictine values, and that the monastery will continue rather than eventually close. They begin discerning a Vision Framework to answer the question: For Benet Hill Monastery to serve as a beacon for Benedictine values, both during and after the sisters' lives, what must happen to make that work?

Discernment begins: Guided by Sister Susan Schorsten, Sisters reflect on Charism, Mission, and Vision Statements, and evaluated the future in terms of aging members, new members, governance, finances, ministries, health care, and leadership. Mission Advancement Audit / Sisters hire Kimberley Sherwood and Chuck Gale, local consultants, to evaluate the monastery's ability to build its capacity to grow resources for ministry. The report uncovers three crucial questions that must be answered first to be successful: What is the plan for the sisters as they age? What is the concept for the monastery beyond the sisters' lifetimes? What is the vision for hope and hospitality for as far as we can see into the future?

Futuring Team / Sisters renew work to complete their Vision Framework. A team is commissioned and blessed to continue this work on their behalf. Led by our consultants, a small team of sisters, oblates, Sunday mass participants, alumnae, and staff begin their work. From February – June, they conduct zoom interviews with approximately 80 stakeholders and 5 Benedictine communities. They review analogous research, and complete the monastery's draft Vision Framework at an all-day June retreat.

January 202

Directional Statements / Sisters meet to set priorities for the next six years, in preparation for the new prioress. For the first time, oblates fully participate in a community meeting with the sisters as the Futuring Team observes.

High Speed Internet / Sisters and employees struggle to carry on ministry duties online because of limited internet bandwidth in our semi-rural location. A plan is developed to bring fiber optic cable to the monastery and a mini-campaign to raise the project cost exceeds goal. Project is completed in March, 2021.



Canonical Visitation / In preparation for the community to discern a new prioress, St. Scholastica Federation Visitators conduct an official review of the monastery. Their report includes fifteen commendations and two recommendations, the latter including "enflesh your commitment to and efforts to support the Futuring Team."

I became familiar with Benet Hill Monastery after listening to a podcast interview with Sister Mary Colleen about the <u>spiritual director program</u>. Several aspects of this program were inviting to me. I could go through the program online from abroad and the tuition was affordable. Little did I know all the blessings I would receive. <u>Sister Mary Colleen</u> and Dana Cossey led us with compassion, wisdom and example through a well-rounded program with a thorough curriculum that is experiential, practical, relational, transformative, contemplative and much more.

In addition, I experienced the blessing of walking with a community of peers on this journey toward transformative wholeness. This led me to a deeper relationship with God and myself while enlarging my capacity to listen with compassion and love others well on their own spiritual journey. It is always difficult to put into words any life-changing experience. There is so much one can say and yet feel that not enough has been said that includes the internal work. Ultimately, it is only with time that a fuller picture will emerge on how this program has benefited me personally. After more than fifty years of ministry as a Religious and as a Teacher, I was ready for a program of spiritual self-discovery for a new direction in my ministry.

The <u>Global Online Benedictine Spiritual Direction Program</u> recommended to me by a Benedictine sister during a retreat at Jamberoo Abbey seemed to tick all the right boxes at the very time I was contemplating retiring from my ministry of teaching. The COVID-19 Pandemic also happened to coincide with the start of the course and gave me a God-sent opportunity to focus on my own spiritual transformation. And this is what has been happening from that time till now. Only now, I realize that this is only the start of a transformation in my own spiritual reawakening.

This reawakening has benefited me and given me new focus on serving others as a companion on our common spiritual pilgrimage. I have begun to see that my life can still be fruitful in its later years. For all this and much more, I am truly grateful to the people running the program, in particular to <u>Sister Mary Colleen</u> <u>Schwarz, OSB</u> and Dana Cossey, and to all the participants in our group who have shared what is most deep and sacred in themselves. As I complete the program, I struly feel that the Spirit has been leading me in a way I could not have foreseen when I began and has given me courage to continue wherever the path will lead.

## Global Graduation Continued...

I began my two-year certification training to become a director under the supervision of Sister Mary Colleen with Benet Hill's <u>Global Online Program</u> in September 2017. After completing Year One in June 2018, I took a two-year leave and reentered the program to complete Year Two in January 2021. I graduate in August 2021 as a certified spiritual director. I became a Benedictine Oblate with Mount Angel Abbey in Oregon in 2006, and have regularly made spiritual retreats to the abbey for over 20 years. My spiritual director is a monk at Mount Angel Abbey. I serve as full-time Lead Pastor of Cannon Beach Community Church in Cannon Beach, Oregon. I am married with three grown married children, and three grandchildren.

I benefited from the Global Online Benedictine Spiritual Direction Program in three key ways. First, I gained heart wisdom by sitting under the wise supervision and training of <u>Sister Mary Colleen</u> and her fine team of supervisors/instructors. Sister Mary Colleen and her team guided our cohort, gathering us from around the world. We joined via video conferencing from USA, Turkey, Mexico, and Australia, learning spiritual direction by doing spiritual direction with a directee, then reviewing our spiritual direction through peer verbatim supervision. It was very rewarding to learn spiritual direction with others from around the world using this process. Second, I gained deeper God awareness and inner self understanding through the two years of modules. The Modules included: paths of contemplative spirituality, dream tending, learning the Enneagram and Myers Briggs, writing a spiritual autobiography and a rule of life, exploration of the interface of sexuality and spirituality, hospitality and Benedictine spiritual values, trauma and suffering in spiritual direction, co-dependence and addiction, among other practical themes and approaches to spiritual direction. Third, I learned how to listen. I learned how to listen to the soul of another, hearing the heart wisdom behind the words within another person's story. I also learned better to pay attention to the voice and movement of God's Spirit at work within the soul of another. This dual listening, listening to God while listening to neighbor, is one of the most fruitful gifts from this program, and certainly one of the best *David Robinson MDiv, DMin ObISB, 2021 Graduate* 

We traveled together into the mystery and suffering of the global pandemic. This experience unfolded within each student's story the heart wisdom of compassion to love well. ## Mission Advancement: Wise Giving

In Ancient Greece, the owl was a symbol of wisdom; supposedly, an owl sat on the Goddess Athena's blind side so that she could see the whole truth. The image of an owl came to mind recently, as I was having an email conversation with a longtime friend and supporter of the sisters' mission. This friend has a tax-wise giving strategy that makes a lot of sense for philanthropists of a "certain age." He typically makes an annual Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) from a traditional Individual Retirement Account (IRA) to all the charitable organizations he loves and supports, including the monastery. This helps to meet his annual Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) from his retirement assets without increasing his taxable income. This type of giving allows him to be more generous, using the retirement assets he has accumulated over his career.

This friend also shared that last year he gave appreciated stock to the sisters because federal COVID relief measures waived the RMD for 2020. He decided to let his retirement assets continue to grow, and instead transferred stock shares from a brokerage account. Once the shares arrived in the monastery's account, Sister MT completed a sale. By gifting the shares to the monastery, rather than selling the shares himself to make a cash gift, he avoided paying capital gains tax on the stock sale. And again, he was able to be more generous than he could by dipping into his checking account to make a aift.
